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Accreditation: The Method of "Institutional Sanctification" By Dr. Jason Koppen, President

This article is the third in a four-part series on each of IBC's four initiatives: Expansion, Vocation, Accreditation, and Extension.

This newsletter is our "65th anniversary edition"! Within the following pages you'll find a number of connect-points to the history of Indian Bible College (alumni from the 20th century, anniversary celebrations, anniversary video link, etc.). It is fitting that in this edition we are highlighting the IBC initiative of accreditation, as this became a desired pursuit of IBC administration (particularly John Greenfield) in the 1980s. In the 1990-1991 school year an articulation agreement was formed with (and later canceled by) Moody Bible Institute, which was written partially in the hope that this agreement would help IBC achieve accreditation. In 1992 a relationship began with the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), an affiliation that was replaced a decade later with our current partnership with the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE). Over the decades MANY people contributed to elevating the standards of IBC's academic excellence that prepared the school for accreditation. After 30 years of pursuit, Indian Bible College finally achieved applicant status with ABHE in 2014, followed by candidate status in 2017, and initial accreditation in 2021. (continued on page 2)

Compassionate Student Life

IBC sent nine representatives to the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE) conference in Orlando in February. Josh Manning (Dean of Men) and Coreen Esplin (Dean of Women) were asked to lead a workshop on "Compassionate Student Life," discussing topics such as restorational discipline and the application of grace and truth. We are very thankful for the voice IBC has been given to speak into the ABHE family of colleges and universities!



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Accreditation comes with great benefits. It provides students with guaranteed recognition of class credits with the other 160 ABHE schools and also increases the likelihood of transferability to state and public schools. It has gained graduates additional access to graduate education; about half of recent bachelor's graduates are considering or actively pursuing master's degrees. Accreditation provides the constant mandate to, and assistance in, the pursuit of excellence, giving our students a high quality education. Accreditation gives IBC a voice in biblical



higher education (see sidebar on page 1). Finally, accreditation has provided access to Pell Grant and tribal scholarship funds, which provide additional tuition revenue that allows us to compensate Native staff as they raise support.

Of course, there are significant challenges to keep accreditation, the greatest of which is maintaining IBC's assessment process when there is significant turnover in the Academic Dean and Registrar positions. IBC is currently on its sixth Registrar in the last 15 years and President Koppen has covered the Academic Dean role four times, totaling eight of the last . 16 years.

In our spring 2022 newsletter we introduced you to Scott Tafoya, founder of Truth Dancer Coaching, LLC in Albuquerque, NM. Scott discovered a passion for coaching while earning his Doctor of Ministry degree from Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary. He found that the practice of coaching was an effective means of empowering others to take ownership of their lives, make meaningful contributions to their communities, and uncover their own agency and potential. Seeing the need for this among the congregations he pastored and served with, and in indigenous communities around the country, he founded Truth Dancer Coaching in 2013.

Sometime later an IBC newsletter arrived in Scott's mailbox and sparked a new idea. After reaching out to IBC President, Jason Koppen, he began travelling regularly from Albuquerque to speak in chapel, guest teach, and provide training and support to IBC's volunteer life coaches. We are delighted to share that as of December 2023, Scott has joined the IBC staff as our first ever Indigenous Leadership Coach! In this new role, Scott will provide invaluable leadership development expertise for our staff, students, and alumni through coaching, training, mentoring, teaching, and program & resource development.

The addition of Scott to the IBC staff marks an important milestone for the school – **our staff is now over 50% Native American!** The significance of this cannot

be overstated, as this milestone aligns closely with IBC's vision of seeing Native America cease to be the mission field and become a mission force. Additionally, the opportunity to be taught, guided, and mentored by other Native believers is invaluable to our students. We celebrate this milestone and are excited to welcome Scott to the IBC staff!

Celebrating 65 Years of Indian Bible College!

Indian Bible College was founded in October 1958 when four Navajo men sat down with Gordon Fraser to study the Bible around his kitchen table. Fraser was responding to the vision cast by Harry Ironside and reinforced by his own experience—that there was a desperate need for training that would prepare Native Americans to be leaders in the Evangelical church. By 1961 the school had purchased several buildings and was incorporated in the state of Arizona as Southwestern School of Missions. At the time, the primary emphasis was on training Navajo men to minister in their own language.



Over the years that mission has expanded to include the training of indigenous

men and women of all tribes in the skills necessary to lead in the Native church and beyond. In 1985, when the school began offering bachelor degrees, it started operating as Indian Bible College. We have now graduated over 220 students from 57 Native American and Canada First Nations tribes. As we wrap up our 65th school year, we are grateful for God's provision, guidance, and sustaining hand, and we are grateful for YOU—God's people—who have come alongside us in countless ways to serve Christ by building up the Native church.



To celebrate our 65th school year, Indian Bible College staff and students hosted events in Arizona, Nevada, California, Oregon, Washington, Montana, and Idaho, telling the IBC story and casting a vision for the school's future.
